Exceptional Children: Human Rights Rhetoric and Recognition Scenes

In her public lecture, Hesford considers how the discourse of human rights maps vulnerability onto certain children's bodies—but not others—and how these bodies take on the burden of representation in domestic and international politics and law. Specifically, Hesford analyzes cultural mediations of the story of Malala Yousafzai, the 15 year old shot by the Taliban for her advocacy for girls' rights in Pakistan, and the exceptional rhetorics that cast her as a global symbol for democratic maturation and the rationality of rights. Hesford suggests that Malala's story compels us to reassess the normative and to acknowledge the intelligibility of children as agents navigating the political machinery of rights and discursive protocols of global engagement.
